





Storage Tank Maintenance

s I've traveled around this summer I had quite of few questions from area systems about water storage tank maintenance and who I would recommend performing maintenance on their tanks.

Water storage tank maintenance is a crucial part of any water system. More times than not I come across systems who have a storage tank, whether elevated or ground storage, that has gotten to the point of no return - meaning it has been in service for many years and no one has ever done anything to it. The tanks just sit there and become such a common part of their surroundings they forget about it until it's too late. When this happens, the outcome can be catastrophic to the water system.

Tank maintenance shouldn't be taken lightly and should be done on a regular basis. Both the interior and exterior of the tank need to be inspected. The coating on the tank needs to be maintained as problems are found then it needs to be addressed. The last thing you want is that little bit of coating that has flaked off to get moisture behind it because that will cause it to start to deteriorate the metal. Corrosion is a tanks worst enemy and may cause irreversible damage if not detected.


If your tank has a leak it should be repaired as soon as possible. The leak on the tank will only get worse and with time will cause more damage to the tank and will cost more money to repair. Some leaks on tanks are as simple as loosening a few bolts and filling the gap with a sealer and tightening it back down, but other leaks may require much more work such as a patch welded over the top of the leaking area or a complete panel on the tank replaced. Doing a visual walk around of your tank at least once a month may save your system major problems in the future.

Maintenance Companies

Who should I call when I have a problem with my tank? I get this question quite a bit and there are many answers that can be given. Deciding who to use to do repair or inspection work on your tank depends a lot on the tank. Some companies specialize in elevated storage tanks while other are more the ground storage tank type of company. Some things to consider when looking at who you should call for your tank maintenance are:

- What type of tank do I have and who works on these tanks.
- Are they insured and bonded?
- Do they have references and can you call them?
- Do you want to sign into a maintenance agreement with them and if so do they have any wording in the contract that leaves it open ended or the price not set in stone?
- Do they take videos or pictures to show you what they find?

Remember your water storage tank is one of the first things people see when coming into your community, and that reflects on you. If you take care of your tank it will bring a professional image to you and your system.




Blackhawk Water Users District's first water storage tank.

The eleventh Annual Leadership Seminar provided an opportunity for 79 attendees from 18 different systems to learn, network and discuss some of the most pressing issues in rural water today. This year's Leadership marked the fifth year that the Pierre Ramkota has hosted the event. The theme for this year's conference was: Three Organizations, One Purpose. The subject matter covered at the conference identified fundamentals of good governance and how systems, the state association and NRWA work together to move rural water priorities forward.

The 2017 seminar started with video from NRWA President Steve Fletcher's opening remarks at the WaterPro Conference in Reno. President Fletcher identified priorities for National Rural Water and what has been accomplished recently. One of their top priorities is to ensure that systems that want to remain autonomous will not be forced to consolidate with another

system. After the video, Ron Gillen provided a brief presentation on SDARWS's mission, vision and membership priorities. He then discussed the steps that an engaged board member takes to be involved in their system, the state and national levels.

NRWA provided their board certification presentation for the leadership seminar. Jeremiah Corbin, Source Water Protection Specialist presented this information, which included fundamental information on non-profit organizational structure, governance and IRS tax classifications. Another component of this training was a discussion on the shared responsibility of boards and the executive director. Key areas were identified for boards to focus on while areas that should be left to staff were identified as well. A flowchart that identifies NRWA's governing structure and grassroots membership was covered in the next session of this presentation. The presentation ended with a section on strategic planning, the importance of planning and

tips on successfully developing and implementing a strategic plan.

This year's leadership seminar saw an increased use of technology for delivering content. Claudette Attwood, NRWA CFO provided a presentation on financial responsibility. This presentation was delivered via Skype for Business, with Claudette joining us from Duncan, OK. This technology allows us to bring experts from across the country to present information live at a dramatically reduced cost.

Julia McCusker, with CoBank followed the financial responsibility presentation with information on financial ratios and additional fundamental information on financial reports. The main focus of her presentation was to provide attendees with the information that financing entities like to see at financially healthy organizations.

The final presentation of the afternoon was provided by Margo Northrup, SDARWS' attorney on fiduciary responsibility and how it is the main responsibility of board members, and how it can be a complicated and broad topic. Margo covered the key areas of fiduciary responsibility and gave attendees some sound fundamentals to utilize as they govern our rural water systems.

The keynote presenter for the conference was South Dakota Association of Rural Water Systems' President Ron Gillen. President Gillen discussed the similarities and difference of presiding over a rural water system versus the state association. Ron provided some insight into his expectations and passion for rural water.


The seminar resumed at 8:00 am the next day with Dennis N. Davis providing a presentation on the different faucets of SDARWS. Having served as the Executive Director for the past 38 years, Mr. Davis is a wealth of knowledge regarding SDARWS.

Following a break, utilizing Skype for Business, the NRWA Washington DC staff provided an hours' worth of information on how the DC staff leverage the national grassroots support to further rural water priorities. Bill Simpson, Michael Preston, Mike Keegan and Keith Heard. Additionally, NRWA Deputy CEO Matt Holmes dropped into the presentation as he happened to be in the DC office and was participating in a meeting the next office over. The DC staff also showed off their pride and joy – a stuffed pheasant with a squirrel accessory. This trophy resides on the top of a prominent shelf and provides inspiration to DC staff as a reminder of the grassroots supporters they are working for.

After the DC presentation, Dennis Davis returned for an encore presentation. Once Mr. Davis completed the SDARWS breakdown presentation, Ron Gillen thanked the attendees for their time and encouraged them for their feedback as we utilize that information for future leadership seminars.



SDARWS ATTENDS EMERGENCY RESPONSE TRAINING

Emergency: A Rural Water team starts loading diesel generators onto a semi-trailer while others methodically work through the process of connecting generators and bypass pumps. It's only a few weeks after hurricanes like Harvey and Irma made landfall, and 83 Rural Water experts from 23 states are in Cairo, Georgia, training for the next potential disaster.

The annual training has been a part of the National Rural Water Association's focus improving Rural Water's emergency response capability since Hurricane Katrina in 2005. The event was organized and hosted by the Arkansas Rural Water Association, Florida Rural Water Association, Georgia Rural Water Association and Louisiana Rural Water Association at FRWA's emergency warehouse in Cairo. SDARWS sent our newest Circuit Riders Greg Gross and Brant Ager for three days of hands-on training.

"I like to say that emergency response is what you do every day; if a community loses water it's an emergency for them," said Gary Williams, FRWA Executive Director. "What we're training for is when the emergency is more widespread."

The event is designed to cover all aspects of emergency response, from planning and management, to loading and unloading heavy equipment, to connecting emergency generators. These are the foundational skills for emergency response, but each disaster is unique and they often require responders to adapt to those new situations.

"These hurricanes were bad, but they weren't like Hurricane Rita," said Patrick Credeur, LRWA Executive Director, in reference to another, powerful 2005 hurricane that struck Louisiana. "Rita's 20-foot storm surge washed away over 500

homes in the Holly Beach community and pushed the debris 18 miles inland. It was total devastation."

Dennis Sternberg and Jeff Ford from ARWA discussed practical equipment upgrades for associations interested in acquiring their own generators or other emergency response equipment. The primary recommendation was to implement a GPS-based fleet tracking solution that would allow the association to track and manage equipment used during the emergency.

"If it moves; we know about it," Ford said.

Amy Rammo-Kuhs from the Georgia Department of Natural Resources Environmental Protection Division gave a presentation about the operation of Georgia's State command centers during the recent disaster. She also presented coins to employees from Fort Payne, Alabama, in recognition of the community's assistance to Georgia after hurricane Irma.

"I am grateful to have been able to learn from real life emergency experiences that many of our southern associations have. I learned how priceless the knowledge of a good operator is in an emergency situation. Over all I loved the class and hope to attend again in a couple years," said Brant Ager.

"I really enjoyed my time in Georgia and Florida. All of the state offices that helped out made our time there very beneficial. I was very interested in the generator segments. I learned how VFD's can make it possible for smaller generators to do the work of larger ones. This could be invaluable to many of our small towns that want to be prepared, but cannot afford large commercial generators," said Greg Gross. "Sharing work experiences with other circuit riders is always a good way to learn."





A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A WASTEWATER TECH | ERRY HEMEYER

What was your first job?

I started working with Shesley Plumbing and Heating in 1970 laying sewer lines. I spent seven years at this job.

What was your first water or wastewater related job?

Laying pipe – I assisted with both water and sewer pipes. The deepest pipe I laid was 37 feet below the surface of the ground. At the start is was mostly clay tile. Some of the first water main I worked with was Abestos Cement pipe. In about 1976 was the first PVC pipe that I installed.

What does your typical day as a Wastewater Technician entail?

Usually I make appointments ahead of schedule for a certain area. In most cases these are based on requests. We then go and do the job that was planned. The rest of the week I travel around the area I am in. New operators are always on my list to visit when I am in an area. I try to be home on Thursday night and work on my paperwork on Fridays.

What's your favorite thing about being a Wastewater Technician?

The systems always make you feel welcome. There are some systems that I stop in when I'm having a bad day – they seem to know how to make you feel good about yourself. It is also interesting when a significant/positive change is made in a system. One case was when I helped poly pig a system's force main. Before the poly pigging the pumps were pumping 12 gallons per minute; after the pigging the pump generated 125 GPM. In another system I asked for a thank you letter or a letter to my our office saying a did a "bad" job from the Mayor. His response was that if someone wasn't happy with what I did, he would put him in a manhole and weld the lid shut. Comments like these make you feel good inside.

What's the most challenging job you've ever undertaken as a Wastewater Technician?

Working with the systems is great. In most cases the operators are excited about completing a smoke test, poly pigging, camera work or sludge judging. The most exciting and challenging event was the flood in Fort Pierre. The operators were great to work with from the young summer help to the top people in Fort Pierre. There were long days – 16 hour day was a normal work day during that time – but was great to see the confidence and completion of the work at hand.

Poly pigging can always be a challenge. You try to estimate the time it will take, and when the pig doesn't arrive on time it starts to become nerve racking. What went wrong? Is the pig stuck somewhere? What should we do? The pig always arrives – it is just is nerve wracking until it shows up.

How do you think water/wastewater systems could operate more effectively?

The biggest problem I see is when the operators and board members don't talk.

What's the best advice you could give to water/wastewater systems?

Get the board members to travel with you and show them what equipment you have and how it works. This way if the equipment needs work, you can bring the problem to the next meeting and they will know what the problems really are. Board members remember that the cheapest piece of equipment is the operator. Without a good operator none of the other equipment will work.

What advice would you give to a young person who wants to embark on a water or wastewater career?


This is one of the best jobs you can have. I love working with new operators and having them show me around their system and giving them suggestions on how to maintain it. As an operator the job changes every day - one day working with sewers, the next parks, then streets – always a different project every day. The downside is the public not understanding the job. A suggestion for when the public start to bother you, tell them you have to go to the lagoon system to work and that you will look into the situation. Looking for muskrats to shoot is always a good break.



South Dakota Rural Water does many things, and one of the most important benefit to our rural water membership relates to our legislative efforts. Every year

the National Rural Water Association hosts a Rural Water Rally in Washington D.C. to further the work of providing drinking water and wastewater services to rural communities. Rural Water professionals, leaders and customers from every state attend the rally to thank their Senators and Representatives for their support and encourage them to further support the goals and needs of the Rural Water Industry. SDARWS has participated in the Rally since its inception in 1986, and 2018 will be no exception. The Rally provides your Association the opportunity to meet directly with our congressional delegation one-on-one to discuss concerns of SDARWS members and other systems, as well as with their staffers, and USDA. Guest speakers from legislative staffs and federal organizations, like the EPA and USDA, are invited by NRWA to share their views and insight to the assembled guests from across the nation.

SDARWS meets with both of our two Senators and our Representative; we also meet directly with their key staff members to make sure that rural water funding remains a priority. Our time at the Rally usually culminates with a meeting with the loan program specialists at USDA Rural Development. Managers and board members, and even employees of systems make the trek to

DC for this important endeavor.

State rural water associations operate contracts that are funded through the National Rural Water Association. This funding originates with EPA and the Rural Utilities Service (RUS), a division of the USDA. For SDARWS, and more importantly, the public we serve, those programs include three circuit riders, a wastewater tech, a source water protection specialist, and a part-time training specialist. While membership dollars help to support your association, we cannot cover the cost of staff and travel to provide assistance to systems without continued funding through the State of South Dakota, USDA, and EPA.

While the Rally began as an information meeting to make us aware of legislative and regulatory issues affecting our industry, it also prepares us to discuss these very issues with our legislators. There are a few mainline items that we always like to discuss during our time in DC. It is important to note that all rural water priorities are authorized in the Farm Bill or the Safe Drinking Water Act. They are not earmarks.
