

OPERATOR CERTIFICATION TRAINING AND EXAMS

INFORMATION REGARDING IN-PERSON & ONLINE CLASSES

Pre-Registration for in-person and online classes is required and will be limited. Those who have not pre-registered will not be able to attend in person due to room constraints. During the registration process the operator will be able to choose if they wish to attend in-person or online. Once the in-person limit has been reached any additional registrants will be for the online course. Online attendees will be sent a Zoom link and information on how to download course materials. In-person and online class times will take place in the time zone of the in-person class.

Vaccination rates and the course of the COVID-19 pandemic will determine when we can relax our social distancing requirements. If vaccination rates are high and the rate of new cases is low it may be possible to increase the number of people we can accommodate for in person training. Those operators who have pre-registered and were moved to online training will be notified in the event we can increase the number of in person attendees.

Classes start at 8:00 AM Tuesday through Thursday. Classes end at approximately 4:30 PM on Tuesday and Wednesday, and noon on Thursday. One-day Workshops start at 8:30 AM and end at 4:30 PM.

ATTENTION WATER/WASTEWATER SYSTEMS/OPERATORS:

Since 1970, DANR has been charging \$10 or less to take an Operator Certification Exam. The annual charge to renew a certificate has been \$6 or less. Obviously costs have increased since the 70's and DANR has been taking a significant loss every time a certification exam has been taken. The costs for an exam include the cost to have the exam corrected, exam room rental, per diem, and mileage.

SB 53 was proposed by DANR to allow us to charge what the actual cost of each exam is which is approximately \$60. The bill also eliminated the annual renewal fee. SB53 passed both houses of the Legislature and was signed by the Governor on February 24, 2021. The effect is that any OpCert exam taken after July 1, 2021 will cost \$60. With the renewal fee being eliminated, all operators that have the proper number of contact hours and

are still working in the water/wastewater field will have their certificates renewed automatically by DANR on July 1, 2021 and every February 1 after that. The operator does not have to do anything other than ensure they have adequate contact hours based on the certificates held. The operator will receive a notice via email or regular mail noting this.

Also please note that the certification classes offered by South Dakota Rural Water are still free and supported by a contract with DANR.

The three year period runs from February 1 of the renewal year back to February 1 three years previous. For example, for the 2022 renewal only the contact hours acquired between February 1, 2019 through February 1, 2022 are considered.





If you had told me just four short years ago what I am doing



WHY FLUSHING YOUR WATER MAINS IS IMPORTANT

You may be driving through your community or out in a rural area and see a water operator standing by a fire or flush hydrant with water blasting out of it and wonder what are they doing and why are they just letting all that water run on the ground? The answer to that question is they are flushing the water mains in that portion of the water system.

When water enters your water system, from whatever source your system gets its water from, it is high-quality water, and you want to maintain that same quality while it is in your drinking water system. Water lines over time can build up with minerals and sediments left behind in the pipes; these minerals and sediments can and eventually will affect water quality. The answer to keeping these sediments from building up is to flush the water mains. Flushing the water mains allows the water to pass through the pipes at a rapid rate which in turn scours the inside walls of the pipe and breaks the minerals and sediments loose, and then they are carried to the flushing point and removed from the water main.

Much of the learning we do in rural water is through attending conferences. While some people dread spending X-number of days listening to speakers because their boss made them, or feel forced to attend because they drew the short end of the straw at the board meeting, there is no reason to keep this attitude. A conference is like a onestop-shop for everything pertaining to your industry. Where else you can you attend educational sessions, network with other professionals, and meet with vendors who may have the perfect product to make your job easier? Plus, it's always nice to get out of the office for a few days – and hopefully you'll go back to work refreshed and motivated to do your job better! Below are 10 ways to get the most out of attending a conference.

1. READ THE AGENDA AND PLAN OUT WHICH SESSIONS TO ATTEND IN ADVANCE

You may not be able to attend a session in every time slot, so prioritize the ones you most want to attend. If you are attending with others from your system, split up for sessions. Splitting up will maximize how much you're able to learn and ensure that each of you has unique insights to take back to your system. Additionally, stay away from the sessions you could almost teach yourself, and try to attend sessions on topics you have not yet mastered.

2. GET A LIST OF EXHIBITORS

Read the exhibitors list ahead of time and make a list of people and companies you want to speak with. In a large exhibit hall, you may get overwhelmed and never make it to the people you most want to speak to.

3. PARTICIPATE IN THE SESSIONS YOU ATTEND

Don't be shy about questioning the speakers about points you're especially interested in, or would like clarified. Speakers thrive on an engaged audience – there's nothing worse for a speaker than talking to a silent room. Don't forget to take notes – after attending hours of sessions a day, it is easy to forget what you've learned (those hotel notepads do come in handy!)

4. BRING BUSINESS CARDS

While you may not use business cards in the rest of your work life, you may go through dozens at a conference when you're meeting new people. You'll probably also collect dozens too, so make sure to make a few notes on the back of each so you can remember who each person is when you get back to the office.

5. PUT AWAY YOUR SMARTPHONE

You are at the conference to interact with people, and you

don't want your electronic devices to become a barrier against making new connections. Put your phone back in your pocket while you're waiting for a session to begin, or while taking a break in the hallway. You'll look more approachable without an electronic device in the way, and you can take the time to strike up a conversation with other attendees.

6. NETWORK!

Get to know other people who have the same type of job as you. Chances are you'll be sitting by these people during the conference sessions. Take the time to interact with others and exchange information – this is a great way to develop contacts and learn how other systems operate. Much of the learning during conferences happens in the hallways between peers. The people you'll attend sessions with are as important as the sessions themselves.

7. WEAR COMFORTABLE SHOES

Chances are you are going to do a lot of standing around talking to people, and you might even end up standing in some sessions if they are packed. If the conference is in a large hotel or space, you'll do a lot of walking to get around.

8. SOCIALIZE

While it may be tempting to spend your evenings watching Pay-Per-View in your room, a lot of networking happens in the evening – often spontaneously. It is also beneficial to socialize with your co-workers who are attending with you. Building friendly relationships with those you work closely with helps foster team-building and can make your work life more manageable.

9. FOLLOW-UP

When you get back from the conference, follow up with the people you met. Email them to let them know you enjoyed meeting them, and perhaps reference something you talked about. Make sure to set up a phone call or face-to-face meeting with anyone you specifically want to do business or build a relationship with.

10. SHARE YOUR KNOWLEDGE

Hopefully you gained a lot of new information, inspiration, and contacts during your time at the conference. One of the best things you can do post-conference is to share those resources with your fellow co-workers and colleagues. Send out videos of the sessions you thought were valuable, give a talk about something you learned at your next staff meeting, and tell your boss about some of the contacts you made. Hopefully your colleagues will do the same the next time they attend a great conference.
